ASHBY/ HARVARD: Roy S. "Scott" Kimball, 66, of Ashby, formerly of Harvard died Sunday, December 25, 2022, at the University of Massachusetts - Memorial Hospital, Worcester.

Roy "Scott" Kimball passed away peacefully, with his family by his side on December 25, 2022. Scott was born in Concord, Ma. to Roy and Madolyn (Montgomery) Kimball on May 9, 1956. Scott grew up in Concord Mass and graduated from Concord Carlisle High School in 1974.

“ I moved to Concord, MA in April 1971 from San Diego, CA as part of the CCHS class of 1974. Fortunately, I was able play Freshman football and basketball before the move, but the move cut into my freshman baseball season, with the move being difficult. Scott was one of few who befriended me as I finished freshman baseball with Scott at CCHS, with a very patient Mr. David Gordan our head coach, later JV coach and social studies teacher. It's easy to suggest in passing someone is kind, helpful, fun loving, full of life, smart, and more. The truth is Scott was all of that. From the usual pranks of rubbing Vaseline or Atomic Bomb in another's jock strap, Scott was a willing accomplice. As freshmen, we were trying to get bigger and stronger, which meant supplementing workouts with trips to Friendly's before or after practice that might include Joel Mascolo and others. Of course we never minded having more senior girls around. Other than tipping a beer now and then in later days with Scott, there are two stories that come to mind first (there are others): Our freshman year, hands down Scott is our biggest guy playing first base, with the most powerful swing no doubt. So, we're playing for an away game against Middlesex with no fence, which is a bit of a bummer, but maybe not on that day. Scott hit what I thought to be a record shot between the center fielder and left fielder to where Scott touched home plate after touching them all, and before the ball was fielded. I obviously scored easily from first base, to this day I've never seen a ball roll that far, even while playing in college. That's the truth, and I'm sticking to it. Secondly, I enjoyed the one up bantering with Scott all through high school, and while we both played sports, we both took all of the shop classes we could and repaired our own and family vehicles. So, Scott acquired and possibly refurbished a beautiful orange metallic Dodge Roadrunner. Oh what a sweet ride with jump. The usual banter the entire Senior was simply a remark I could take him if I tweaked my dad's 1968 Ford Thunderbird 429 (8 cylinder) engine. We'll, I later bought the car, but in advance of that I would maintain the vehicle routinely. Well, when my dad was in Iran for the Air Force over a window that covered the prom, I was offered the car for the prom. Without boring you with more details, suffice to say I put headers on

and tri-carb, and was ready for Scott at post-prom. The suspense is building right! So, we line up to race without a starter; Scott jumps the gun for how we agreed to start; I waited for Scott to turn back while I waited. Now for the rest of the story.....I gave up and went back to the party. I received a call the next morning indicating Scott had rolled his Roadrunner. That served as a moment of awakening for me. With the introduction of FACEBOOK, I had always hoped to reconnect with Scott, but was never able to. Even upon my infrequent trips to the Boston area after moving to California, then Colorado, starting in 1976, I had from Charlie Dee and others that Scott had started an oil distribution company. May I posthumously congratulate Scott on that venture, and I hope on a life well lived. While I've heard the words stated "there are no better friends than those we make or hold onto around age 12", I happen to believe that may be true, but Scott may be an exception for me.
